

For Adults Only!

What's this?? Well, adult leaders can better help their Scouts to have safe fun and rewarding experiences if the leaders have taken the proper training to offer those experiences. BSA-certified training for a number of courses is available online or at scheduled district or council group courses. Although online is convenient, it is always much more valuable and enjoyable to take group courses, as the interaction with the other leaders can yield so much. How can one find what courses are offered? Simply look at the training calendars on the websites for our Council (www.ocscouts.org), or our District (www.impeesadistrict.org). Here's what's coming up soon:

Impeesa District Roundtable: Occurring on the first Thursday night of each month (except July), district leaders get together to discuss the upcoming events and ways to help run those events. There is food, fun, and the chance to share with other unit leaders, and it is held at 7:00 pm at the LDS Church at 5060 Six Forks Road. No advance sign-up needed, and it's free!

SM / ASM Leader Specific: This course is part of what is required to be a trained Scoutmaster or Assistant Scoutmaster, and is the lecture presentation portion. As seen on the Council website, this course will be offered on May 3^{rd} , 5^{th} , and on June 18^{th} . This is an excellent way to better understand the general goals in Scouting.

Introduction to Outdoor Leadership Skills (IOLS): This is the practical outdoor application of basic Boy Scout skills that are required for achievement of the First Class rank. In one weekend attendees will learn and demonstrate the skills that our Scouts will need to master in their Tenderfoot, Second Class, and First Class ranks. It is fun, and you can better teach the skills to your Scouts when you know and have done them yourself! There will be a course soon on May 19th, and the weekend of May 27-29 (must attend all sessions). This course will also be offered in August and September.

Troop Committee Challenge: This course describes the proper operation of the Troop Committee, and how it could be well organized. An excellent course for those parents who want to help, but may not be able to attend campouts as an ASM. The next course is scheduled for November 17th.

Don't let your Scouts be the only ones who get to be outside and have all the fun! Get involved, and sign up soon for some BSA courses. They're great!

National Youth Leadership Training

July 29-31 and August 5-7, 2011

The Occoneechee North Star National Youth Leadership Training is now taking applications for attendance. This is a two weekend (six day) outdoor experience for current and future leaders of the troop or crew. The conference utilizes the standard troop structure using the patrol method. Patrol leadership changes daily to give all Scouts a chance to be a Patrol Leader or Assistant. The participants write their own Vision Statements in which they plan how to use their newly acquired skills in their home troops/crews. The Conference has been developed by the National Council BSA and is the highest leadership training offered to youth leaders at the Council level.

WHO MAY ATTEND? Participants may be any current or future leader in the Scout Troop. To be eligible to attend, the Boy Scout must be at least First Class in rank and 13 years old by the start of the course, at least attended one year of summer camp, and has completed Troop Leadership Training (TLT). All participants must have an outstanding Scouting spirit; a team-player attitude; a working knowledge of camping, hiking, and cooking over an open fire in all weather conditions; and have the written approval of their Scoutmaster. Enrollment is limited to 48 qualified participants.

WHAT IS THE COST OF THIS COURSE?

The total cost for NYLT is \$210 which covers course materials, T-Shirt, hat, and food for the course. A fee of \$75 is required with the application form and the remaining \$135 is due no later than July 1st.

AFTER THE WAVE: JAPAN'S TSUNAMI ZONE

An exhibit of exceptional photography opens April 30 Takaaki Iwabu, a staff photographer at Raleigh's

News & Observer, left for Japan 10 days after the earthquake and tsunami that destroyed much of that country's northern coast and left more than 27,000 people dead or missing.

His photos, which will be on display at the NC Japan Center in Raleigh from April 30 - July 29, 2011, show this was more than a news assignment for Iwabu. It was a homecoming. He looked beyond the physical devastation to focus on survivors, providing a tender look at people enduring unbearable loss and moving ahead.

"Many tsunami victims I met displayed extraordinary humbleness and compassion," he says. "It was they who worried about my welfare."

Iwabu, 42, moved from Japan to the United States 20 years ago. He has worked at the News & Observer for 6 years, and before that at The State in Columbia, South Carolina. His work has appeared in the New York Times, the Washington Post and many other U.S. papers. Iwabu has won numerous photography awards, including a Silver Award from Society of Newspaper Design.
