# Troop 28 Patrol Leadership Training

April 16-17 2010

The current Patrol Leadership Council (PLC) members, as well as those who were on the PLC last term (Sep 09 - Mar 10) were invited to attend the Youth Leadership Training campout on April 16-17 at the Overlook Campsite. There was training in basic leadership skills and discussion on Friday evening and Saturday morning. Each leader learned what their position responsibilities are and what part they play in making the troop function. This training is an important step in enhancing the youth leadership skills in the Troop.

One of the games was "Monster" in which each group formed a monster, capable of moving and talking. The group was instructed to join themselves together to make a monster. The monster travels using both its hands and feet and also makes its own sound before and after it moves. The group must form a monster that walks with one more leg than the number of members of the group and one arm less. (A group of five would form a monster with six legs and four arms to walk.) When the monster is created, have it make its noise and move 20 feet or so, stop, and make its noise again.

From campouts to High Adventure, Scouting happens outdoors. Since its inception, Scouting has centered on teaching values through working and playing outside, and fostering respect and understanding of one's natural surroundings.

The Year of Celebration Outdoors Award is geared toward getting individuals active in nature. The recipients must participate in outdoor activities and show growth in personal outdoor skills. They must also demonstrate increased knowledge of nature. Scouts must show understanding of the impact humans can have on ecosystems and why one must Leave No Trace when experiencing the outdoors. Adults and alumni are encouraged to share their outdoor Scouting experiences with Scouts, as well as non-Scouts of all ages. The Award centers on principles of stewardship, discovery, and personal

#### Complete three of the five requirements to earn this award

#### **Boy Scouts**

- 1. Earn Hiking, Camping, Backpacking, Canoeing or Wilderness Survival merit badges.
- 2. Attend a Scout overnight campout and practice the principles of Leave No Trace.
- 3. Attend a full session of council summer camp, participate in a council or national High Adventure program, or earn the -50 Miler Award.
- 4. Participate for at least two hours in an outdoor conservation project approved by your Scout leader.
- **5.** Participate in a Scout backpacking trip separate from requirement No. 2.

## **N.C.** Museum of History

#### SCOUTING: 100 YEARS OF ADVENTURE

The exhibit *Scouting: 100 Years of Adventure* at the N.C. Museum of History in Raleigh commemorates the centennial anniversary of the Boy Scouts of America. Since 1910 more than 100 million people have experienced the excitement and benefits of this organization. The small exhibit, developed by the Occoneechee Council based in Raleigh, offers a glimpse of the Boy Scouts' past and brings it to the present. Admission is *free*.

Visitors will see items ranging from a 1910 Boy Scout uniform and handbook to numerous award-winning pinewood derby cars made by current members. The exhibit explores several of Scouting's more popular elements and themes, including high adventure, the Order of the Arrow, pinewood derbies, duty to God and country, volunteerism, uniforms, and notable Eagle Scouts.

"We want this exhibit to stir up fond memories for former Scouts and inspire dreams of adventure for future Scouts," says Seth Asbill, District Executive, Occoneechee Council, Boy Scouts of America. "Celebrating our past is a vital part of our preparation for the future. This engaging exhibit shares elements of Scouting's rich history, and we hope that others will discover all this great organization has to offer."

Other exhibit items from past decades include an official Boy Scout cook kit, patches, pocketknives and canteens. Among the photographs is a 1913 image of the first Boy Scout troop in Raleigh. Nearby is the 1926 charter establishing Durham's first troop.

Video components in *Scouting* show contrasting footage of local summer camp activities in the 1940s and modern Scouts taking advantage of abundant opportunities, whether it's rock climbing, snorkeling, sailing or volunteering in the community. The exhibit also features an interactive knot-tying station.

Scouting will remain open throughout the summer. The N.C. Museum of History is located at 5 E. Edenton St., across from the State Capitol.
