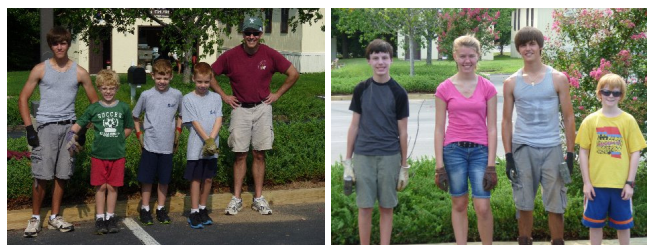
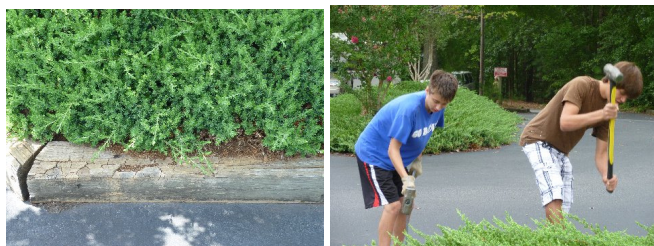
TROOP 28 EAGLE CORNER

COOKING

Campfire Cookout

- 1 1/2 pounds ground beef
- 1 1/2 teaspoons salt
- 1 teaspoon pepper
- 1 green bell pepper, sliced
- 4 large carrots, sliced
- 4 large potatoes, sliced
- 1 large onion, sliced
- Worcestershire sauce

Mix ground beef, salt and pepper. Shape into 4 large patties. place each patty on a large square of heavy-duty foil. Cover each patty with prepared vegetables, then sprinkle each meal liberally with Worcestershire sauce. Cook for 15 minutes over hot coals, then turn and cook on the other side for 15 minutes.

Meet the Assistant Scoutmasters

Dennis Ritter

When did you join Troop 28? I became assistant Scoutmaster for Troop 28 in March 2004 when my youngest son, Kevin, bridged over from Pack 28 into the troop. I was already an assistant scoutmaster at Troop 104 for 3 years with my older son, and he transferred to troop 28 as well.

What have you done with the troop? I have planned many troop meetings, outings, campouts and summer camps. I became Scoutmaster in 2005 and I went thru many of the BSA courses offered to the adult volunteers, including the Woodbadge course, in order to become a better leader. I have been with the boys on summer camp 7 times and I took a group of Venture Scouts to camp Sea Base in Florida for a week long sailing adventure.

What are you focusing on now? Eagle adviser, to help any Life scout in the troop on their path to Eagle.

What are your favorite activities? Almost anything outdoors, such as hiking, camping, backpacking and gardening. I enjoy travel and seeing new things. I also like to build stuff and enjoy woodworking, carpentry, construction and cooking. I also really enjoy working with our youth to help them learn a new skill and to develop good character and leadership. It's fascinating to watch them grow.

Any words of advice for the Scout parents? Consider the EDGE method as a parent. When a boy first joins the troop as a boy scout, he may have a lot of apprehension and questions. As a parent you can explain to him what to expect and what to do. If you are not sure yourself, you and your son can ask one of the adult leaders in the troop to explain. As your son grows and becomes more comfortable in the troop, he may still need you to demonstrate how to do things, such as how to get ready for a campout. With further experience, your scout may only need some Guidance. Eventually, they have the program figured out and they need you to just enable them to continue to grow in scouting. Have your son share with you what they have learned or what they enjoy about scouting. It could be learning a new skill in a merit badge session, or a great campout, or usually it is the new and fun game the troop played. Boy scouts offer a great opportunity for your scout to learn, grow and become leaders, if you let them. For new scout parents, I also recommend to get involved in the troop and work with the other adults. I have made some really great friends with the other adults in the troop over the years.

Have you ever been in or seen a Soapbox Derby? You know, where you ride a cart down a hill. Or, have you ever ridden a sled down a long hill? Or, how about floated down river in an innertube?

These all have three things in common. They're all fun. They all require no effort - you just sit there and coast. And, they all take you downhill.

Just like in those activities, you can coast doing other things. You can coast through school, just getting good enough grades. You can coast through sports, just playing the games.
